

This past Veterans Day, the Muhlenberg School District hosted its annual Veterans Day Breakfast. A free breakfast was offered to any veteran who attended. The turn out this year was great, with 65 local area veterans attending, including a handful of school district employees who served. There were veterans in attendance from WWII, Korea, Vietnam, and from our most recent Operations in Iraq & Afghanistan.

The event started with cadets from our AFJROTC unit and students from our National Honor Society greeting the vets at the High School Main Entrance and walking them to the cafe. There, they went through the food line and sat together to eat breakfast. It was special to see the veterans sharing their life experiences with the students.

A short ceremony was held punctuated by the graceful singing of the *National* Anthem and America the Beautiful by the Muhlenberg HS Choir. The Brass Ensemble played a spirited version of The Salute to Services, and everyone clapped and cheered for their respective service when they heard their songs! Three AFJROTC cadets performed a very solemn ceremony where they folded a U.S. flag that had been flown at the High School. This flag was then presented to

**Jason Heflin**, a U.S. Marine and a teacher at the high school, in recognition of his time in the service.

The ceremony was highlighted by the donation of more than \$9,000 to the Pennsylvania Wounded Warriors from the Muhlenberg AFJROTC unit. This money was raised through pledges received from the cadets completing the

Bataan Death March Memorial Hike at Valley Forge in October (page 8).

Overall, it was an amazing event. Everyone enjoyed themselves and the wonderful breakfast offered by the High School Cafeteria Staff as well as the thoughtful ceremony put on by Muhlenberg Students. We cannot wait to host this event again next year.

## **Bataan Death March Memorial Hike**

On Saturday, October 14, 2022, forty-four Muhlenberg HS JROTC Cadets participated in The Bataan Death March Memorial Hike held at Valley Forge National Park. This annual event pays tribute to the American and Filipino troops that suffered and died during the Bataan Death March during WWII.

Cadets were broken into three groups: FAST, FASTER, & FASTEST. This allowed all of our cadets to push themselves to their absolute limit. While each group set their own pace during the hike, everyone finished and afterwards

they sat around and ate Military Meals Ready to Eat (MREs) that had been donated by the PA National Guard. The cadets appreciated and enjoyed the MREs after completing the Memorial Hike, and all participants took advantage of the quiet bus ride home.


This year the cadets decided they wanted this event to mean even more. The thought was that Valley Forge exists to honor the suffering of the Revolutionary Soldier and the hike is meant to honor the suffering of the WWII soldier, but

they wanted to find a way to help those among us whose wounds are still fresh. The cadets decided to collect pledges for a worthy cause, the Pennsylvania Wounded Warriors. The PA Wounded Warriors is a charity that helps severely wounded, post 9/11 veterans here in our state. They set a goal to raise \$2,500 and then they challenged other Veterans' Organizations to match their goal.

The cadets exceeded their goal! They raised over \$4,000, and they received matches of \$3,500 for a total of more than \$7,500!

The Muhlenberg Junior High School is seeking new heights with the addition of the Muhlenberg Junior High School Climbing Club for the 2022-2023 school year! **Donald Heinz**, ELA/ESL teacher as well as an avid and accomplished climber himself, has teamed up with **Makenzie Kistler**, ESL teacher, to introduce the MJHS students to the newly-minted Olympic sport of gym-climbing.

The group meets Wednesdays at the Reading Rocks Climbing Gym at 550 George Street, Reading, from 3:30 to 5:00 p.m. To make the climbing experience more accessible, Reading Rocks generously cut their entrance/rental fee in half (normally \$12) for secondary students ages 13 and up. Students have been enthusiastic to get a taste of what climbing greats like Janja Garnbret and Alex Megos experience, scrambling up overhanging walls of multiplex boards dotted with plastic, color-coded holds.

The hope is that the club will grow into a team sport, and as other schools add teams, eventually students may have opportunities like going to the Olympics or receiving climbing scholarships to schools like Penn State or Alabama. Some schools in the area already have long-standing clubs. The Climbing Club is also a door to the exhilarating outdoor version of the sport exemplified by the Birdsboro Climbing Quarry, which has over 150 bolted routes as high as 140 feet!



### **Aevidum Club**

The Talk Workshop: Aevidum student leaders from the Muhlenberg School District facilitated this energy-filled, student designed and developed, interactive workshop. During the workshop, students learned Aevidum's four characteristics of a healthy community: acceptance, appreciation, acknowledgment, and caring. Next, they brainstormed concrete ways in which they can promote these concepts in their schools. We had 12 different schools present for the workshop and over 20 Muhlenberg student leaders who helped facilitate.



According to Licensed Behavior Specialist **Zach Milch**, "In years past, education's view of students' mental health and behavioral supports was not always on the forefront. However, over the last few years, the data and professional literature has shown that it is an integral part of the educational program. MSD has stepped up for the cause with this department and launched a full-scale plan. I am very proud of the values of this district and the emphasis on helping our students"



On World Kindness Day, Muhlenberg High School Aevidum students worked together to bring kindness to the high school and held a "SOUP Throwdown" which featured over ten different soups that staff was able to purchase for lunch served by the students.



While the department is in its first year, the impact is noted across all four schools in the district. The department has named **Mike Mish** the director and added four Licensed Social Workers, **Liliana** 

Moore, Emily Carmichael, Lauren Heydt, and Amanda Foulds across the campus.

The Talk Workshop was a mental health awareness workshop that MHS hosted for 12 different schools in Berks County who either have or are bringing an Aevidum Club to their school. It allowed our young adults to work together to eradicate the stigma of mental health while leaning on one another for support.



## **Aevidum Club**



"With leadership and our highly trained and passionate new staff members, we have been able to accomplish new initiatives for students in just a few short months," stated Zach Milch.

Since August, the department has initiated a behavioral health screener (SBIRT) for all students in 9th grade, started the Aevidum Club to promote positive mental health, expanded its services for students in transitional housing and launched an attendance mentoring program. The district has expanded to include two on campus school based outpatient therapy providers, Malvern Behavioral Health and Mind Matters Counseling Associates. The Caron Foundation is continuing to provide the Student Assistance Program and Social Emotional Learning is being taught in all grades. In addition, every building has a great mix of energetic school counselors who are a benchmark in professional knowledge.

"I want to thank the social workers for their tireless work and dedication to our families, children, and young adults. We have a professional obligation to meet and address the needs of our students. They have gone above and beyond expectations and continue to put mental health at the forefront of the needs of our district. I want to thank our Licensed Behavior Specialist, Mr. Zach Milch, who engages with our more extensive students in need, providing clinical and therapeutic services as a professional. He is now assisted with boundless practices and follow up from our Director of Pupil Services, Mr. Michael Mish."



Bounce Out the Stigma: MHS and MJHS students partnered with the MSD Basketball team to talk about the importance of bringing awareness to mental health. We were able to survey over 100 community members with a 10-question true/false quiz about mental health.



MHS Aevidum met with MEC second graders to read a story about kindness and do an activity about self-love and self-esteem focusing on the importance of finding one thing a day to look forward to.



Block Out the Stigma provided our MHS football players an opportunity to wear Aevidum stickers on their helmets while we had a table full of mental health materials that allowed our community members to know about the resources right here in our community.











One of the biggest initiatives at C.E. Cole this year is to build relationships with staff and students. To support this initiative, a plan appropriately named, #COLEture of Respect, was devised! Assistant Principal Jaclyn Bellanca was instrumental in spearheading this movement. This hashtag was voted on and approved by the staff and was the foundation that teachers could use in their individual classrooms in creating their own personalized hashtag. With the #COLEture of Respect, teachers, cafeteria workers, bus drivers, custodians, and other district staff, could give #COLEture of Respect tickets to students if they saw them demonstrating any of the following:

- Respect in the hallways
- Respect in the cafe

- Respect for students
- Respect for adults
- Respect on the bus

Students accumulated these tickets, and on Fridays, their tickets were put into a box in their classrooms and one winner was drawn to have lunch and an ice-cream treat with Haniff Skeete, Jaclyn Bellanca, and **Emily Carmichael** in the cafe. Students have been very excited to win and have worked hard to get to the table that is decorated in their honor. During the lunches, the students' names are called out, and they are cheered on by their peers. This initiative has been successful and is a positive step in changing the culture of Cole. Jon Gordon says, "Culture consists of the shared purpose, attitudes, values, goals, practices, behaviors, and habits that define a team or organization." That is our vision for C.E. Cole.

## **Unit Inspection of MSD AFJROTC**

On December 2, 2022, the Muhlenberg AFJROTC Unit received its first Official Unit Evaluation from the U.S. Air Force. Each AFJROTC unit is required to receive an evaluation every three years to ensure unit viability and compliance. Every aspect of the unit was evaluated, and in every category, the Muhlenberg AFJROTC passed with flying colors.

Overall, the unit received an EXCEEDS STANDARDS (military parlance for A++) and EXCEEDED STANDARDS on 21 different assessment items.

The evaluation started with an inspection of every single cadet, in formation, in the High School Gymnasium. Next, the unit performed a 30 Command Drill Sequence. The evaluator commented that they were "the best she's seen!"

Cadets **Joel Ponce** and **Kailyn Lutz** were both awarded the Top
Performer awards for their work
leading up to this inspection.

There were two focus areas for this inspection. The first was to ensure that the Muhlenberg School District was fully supporting this program. It was very clear to the inspector from the moment that she stepped in the door that the entire school community fully supports both the JROTC program and most importantly the cadets. The support received across the district is unwavering.

The second focus was on the cadets. This is a cadet run program, and they do everything from managing logistics to running the drill and ceremonies teams, to scheduling events, and even recruiting new cadets. It is important for the cadets to get

this type of experience, and what is most impressive is their ability to learn from their failures by assessing what went wrong, regroup, and reattack the issue at hand. This part of the inspection is a time-consuming process, but it results in real learning and a buyin to something bigger than themselves along with a sense of belonging and accomplishment. It was clear to the evaluator that the cadets excelled in managing the program. In fact, the inspector engaged almost exclusively with the cadets throughout the day.

"I'm sure that none of this is a surprise to anyone who knows our cadets and our program, as it wasn't a surprise to me ... our kids are the best, and I'm not afraid to say that," shared **Major Campbell**.
