The Great Gilly Hopkins, Katherine Paterson, (Dell Publishing)

Gilly is a rebellious foster child who is constantly changing families. When she finally finds a place she can call home, she pulls a stunt which changes everything.

Hatchet, Gary Paulsen, (Simon Pulse)

Thirteen year old Brian Robeson is the only passenger on a small plane flying him to visit his father in the Canadian wilderness when the pilot has a heart attack and dies. The plane drifts off course and finally crashes into a small lake. Miraculously, Brian is able to swim free of the plane, arriving on a sandy tree-lined shore with only his clothing, a tattered windbreaker, and the hatchet his mother had given him as a present. The novel describes, in gritty detail, Brian's mistakes, setbacks, and small triumphs as, with the help of his hatchet, he manages to survive 54 days alone in the wilderness until his rescue.

The variety of themes and literary elements within the book make it an excellent choice for the sixth graders.
